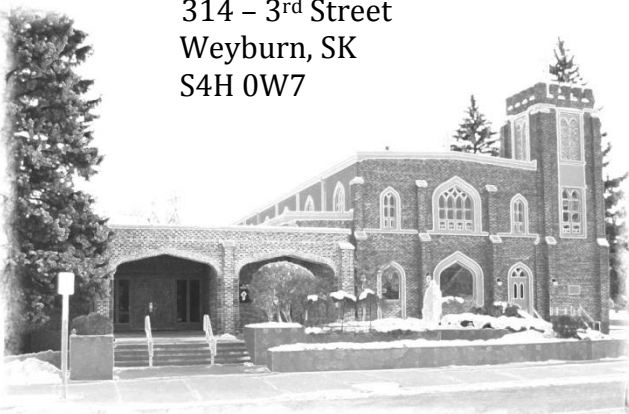

Good News.....

Our English word hypocrite comes from a Greek word that is pronounced almost the same. The Greeks often used the word to describe acting, but its root meaning is closer to this: “*One who pretends or acts under a mask.*” We might describe such a person as “two-faced.” There are several places in the gospels where Jesus calls the Pharisees hypocrites because they say one thing and do another. Their actions appear to be part of a show so that others will think that they are good and holy. Jesus cuts to the heart of the matter when he points out that clinging to the letter of the law is not what makes someone holy. Rather, it is the person with a pure heart free of greed, malice, envy, and evil of all kinds who is closer to God.

Jesus has the Old Testament Scriptures on his side. Psalm 15 lays out a wonderful description of the ones who will dwell with God forever in heaven. First and foremost, they are not hypocrites. Rather, they have integrity of heart and speak the truth (15:2). They “never defame a neighbor” (15:3). They practice what they preach and do it for the greater glory of God. We all have moments when we act better (or sometimes worse) than we are because we want to appear differently to others. The challenge for us today is to be genuine, to let the love of God become the model for how we love. Then we will have no need to worry about whether we are following the law. Our own actions will tell us so.

FROM PASTOR'S DESK:

Continuing this reflection on Pope Francis' recent Encyclical, "On Care for Our Common Home", we embark upon what seems to be a very daunting read of Chapter 2, which seeks to provide an overview on what is happening globally to our common home. Although the planet earth seems small when viewed from space by the astronauts and its span can be covered by the advancement of jet travel, yet a comprehensive view of what is happening the world-over, let alone in our province and country, is difficult for a person or community to grasp. What this chapter tries to help us to appreciate is that we are a unified whole, so that what is done in one part of ecosystem affects the rest in terms of pollution and climate change, the issue surrounding water and its availability for all peoples, the loss of biodiversity, the decline in the quality of human life and the breakdown of society, the problems of global inequality, and the compounding problems of weak responses on the part of individual countries and the international politics. Far from making a definitive statement on these matters, Pope Francis raises them as outstanding issues that are far more connected than we realize and accept, and how we need to take them seriously so that we can begin to address them in a more wholesome and unified approach before it is too late to reverse the trend of destructive activity and policies. What stands out in this section which is not easy to read and to keep together is the complexity of the issues involved, and how the Church is not so much offering a particular solution or opinion on what needs to be done specifically, except that we do need to take action, to have some frank and honest discussion as we recognize the serious danger that the world is facing. While experts and governments need to come together to address these issues, we need to be more collectively inclusive of all segments of society into finding answers to what affects each person ultimately. Changes in the climate and environment are not just technological or scientific problems to be solved by applying technological solutions alone; they are primarily social problems affecting the lives of many people, most often and most immediately the poor and vulnerable in our midst. When we disregard and ignore God as the Creator of our earth and universe along with all that exists, and His plan for unity and harmony for its healthy functioning, then things will run amuck and "go off the rails". After describing one series of disappointments and problems in various parts of the earth in terms of what I outlined above, Pope Francis does not despair nor feel that things are utterly hopeless, as he writes: "Hope would have us recognize that there is always a way out, that we can always redirect our steps, that we can always do something to solve our problems.[61]" {To be continued.....}
