Good News.....

When I get engrossed in a book, I try to read it through without stopping. Sometimes I can't help myself and I peek at the last few pages to see where the author is taking me. It is satisfying to let a story unfold and allow ourselves to be surprised, but there is also a secret delight in glimpsing the end of our journey and wondering how the storyteller will get us there. Looking ahead to the end of the story is what the Book of Wisdom wants to do when it says, "Let us see whether his words be true....Let us condemn him to a shameful death; for according to his own words, God will take care of him." The author knows that the end of the story will reveal the truth.


Jesus picks up the story when he gives the second prediction of his passion. He offers the disciples a glimpse of what is yet to come. The disciples, as usual, miss the point. Instead they argue about how they wanted the story to go—with one of them as the greatest over all. Like a good storyteller, Jesus takes them in a different direction. The ending he has in mind does not come close to defining greatness as they think about it—a prize for being the best. Rather, Jesus points to a child, and we suddenly realize that greatness has nothing to do with power or ability, but with innocence and openness to the unfolding tale. The story Jesus tells and the life he lives will include death and resurrection for him and his followers. Let's participate in it fully because we do know how it ends.

Every year, the Bishops of Canada make an appeal for financial assistance to support their work and the work of each diocese by means of the Collection for the Needs of the Church in Canada. The President of the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops (CCCB), the Most Reverend Paul-André Durocher, Archbishop of Gatineau, has described this Collection as "an opportunity to all the faithful to help their dioceses collaborate in financing the regional episcopal assemblies (the Atlantic, Quebec, Ontario, and the West) and also the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops (CCCB). These associations support the Bishops in their local ministry and in working together on issues of common concern." Any additional revenues raised help the diocese support its own diocesan pastoral programs and other activities. The CCCB is the national assembly of the Catholic Bishops in Canada, and includes the Bishops of the Eastern Catholic Churches. The Collection for the Needs of the Church in Canada will be held September 26 and 27, 2015. Through your contribution to the Collection, you too can collaborate with the Bishops in their ministry to teach, sanctify and govern.

FROM PASTOR'S DESK: As we continue reflecting upon Pope Francis' recent Encyclical, "On Care for Our Common Home", we tackle the difficulty of private ownership, particularly when this is so skewed disproportionately in the hands of a few to the great detriment and suffering of so many who are left out completely and have no access to the sustenance necessary for a dignified existence. Pope Francis cautions us against putting all living beings on the same level and thus depriving human beings of their unique worth and the tremendous responsibility this entails: "At times we see an obsession with denying any pre-eminence to the human person; more zeal is show in protecting other species than in defending the dignity which all human beings share in equal measure." [90] While the mistreatment of other living species is never justified, as every act of cruelty towards any creature is contrary to human dignity, we are not to lose sight of the unique value and worth of every human person. "It is clearly inconsistent to combat trafficking in endangered species while remaining completely indifferent to human trafficking, unconcerned about the poor, or undertaking to destroy another human being deemed unwanted." [91] Thus we are to be against abortion and euthanasia more so than the mistreatment of animals, while neither neglecting the latter. Looking upon the earth as a shared inheritance, whose fruits are meant to benefit everyone, in the response of fidelity to the Creator, "Christian tradition has never recognized the right to private property as absolute or inviolable, and has stressed the social purpose of all forms of private property. St John Paul II forcefully reaffirmed this teaching, stating that 'God gave the earth to the whole human race for the sustenance of all its members, without excluding or favouring anyone.' ... He clearly explained that 'the Church does indeed defend the legitimate right to private property, but she also teaches no less clearly that there is always a social mortgage on all private property, in order that goods may serve the general purpose that God gave them." [93] Our Christian understanding leads us to recognize with St. Paul's letter to the Colossians (1:16) the destiny of all creation is bound up with the mystery of Christ, present from the beginning, as "all things have been created through Him and for Him." It would seem that what matters here is our capacity and ability to view all created reality from the perspective of God's way and not simply from our human vantage, so that we measure everything from our outlook and advantage, based upon what seems most convenient and mostly in our favour, rather than seeing the responsibility we bear towards each other within the common heritage and destiny, and try to ensure that everyone has the potential to benefit from what God has entrusted to us, not just for ourselves but for everyone's wellbeing and good. {To be continued.....}
