Today's readings lead us to reflect on the gifts we have been given, and the source of those gifts — God.

In the first reading and in the gospel, we hear of men who raise objections when they see others participating in God's mission. Moses' followers were appalled when they noticed that two men who were not among their company had been given the gift of prophecy. Surely prophesying was not their place. And, in the gospel reading, Jesus' disciples objected to men who were casting out demons in Christ's name.

In both cases, the objectors were assured that the men had been given gifts from God, and their decision to use those gifts to serve God's kingdom was indeed a good thing.

The readings serve to remind us that every one of us has been given great gifts, and we are called to recognize those gifts, to receive them gratefully, and to use them in service of God and neighbor. When we do this, we participate in Christ's own mission of loving service. He came to give Himself for us, and He has given us many gifts so that we can join Him in His earthly mission, using our gifts to proclaim His truth and serve one another.

What gifts has God given you? How are you using them? Do you find yourself caught up noticing the gifts others have been given and wondering about their proper use of them? Or, do you rejoice in the gifts God has given you and others, doing your best to participate in the mission of the Church, serving God by giving yourself and your gifts back to Him in gratitude for all He has given you?



Collection for the Needs of the Church in Canada: An Act of Solidarity: The Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops (CCCB) is mandated by the Holy See and the Bishops of Canada to assist dioceses and their Bishops in a number of areas of pastoral life: faith formation, doctrine, ecumenical dialogues, international relations, interreligious conversations, liturgy, relations with Indigenous Peoples, social justice, and building a culture of life and family. In his letter to the parishes across the country in which he explains the Collection, CCCB President Archbishop Paul-André Durocher of Gatineau points out that this year Collection is being held while a number of families from Canada are participating to the World Meeting of Families in Philadelphia, in response to an invitation from Pope Francis. In addition, the General Synod of Bishops on the family will soon begin. "This twofold coincidence reminds us of the importance of families as part of the Church's mission and as part of the work of the national conference and the regional assemblies. The Church's commitment to families is one more reason why all the faithful in our country will want to ensure the collection's success through their generosity and solidarity," the CCCB President writes.

Stewardship Focus: Lector -

Proclaiming God's Word! Liturgy and Worship is the focal point of our Catholic Faith, where we come together as Catholics to celebrate the fundamental beliefs of our Faith. Our worship is enriched when members of the parish participate in various ministries. These ministries provide many opportunities for the sharing of our time and talent and for giving back the gifts God has given us.

Stewardship opportunity: To proclaim the word of God to the assembled community, to read in such a way that they truly hear the Word that is to change their lives.

Talent/Gift to offer: A clear speaking voice with the ability to understand the main points of the readings for each liturgy and to express them clearly to the congregation.

Time commitment: On a rotation schedule, generally once every 4-6 weeks, depending on the Mass you prefer to attend.

Treasure/Blessing received: By being involved in the Liturgy, the Mass becomes more alive to you as you proclaim God's message to His people and by helping the people to understand and pray the Word.

FROM PASTOR'S DESK:

As could be expected in our continuing reflection upon Pope Francis' recent Encyclical, "On Care for Our Common Home", the next chapter on the human roots of the ecological crisis represents a challenging read, for Pope Francis invites us to consider the mindset of the technocratic paradigm which dominates all considerations in a one-dimensional view of reality. He begins by acknowledging the great strides and advancements that science and technology have made possible in the fields of medicine, engineering and communications, for which we remain most grateful and appreciative. Yet, we must recognize that these advancements have given those with this knowledge, and more precisely those with the economic resources to use this new knowledge, an impressive dominance over the whole of humanity and the entire world. Since this knowledge and economic power is concentrated in the hands of a small number, and given the fact that certain aspects of this knowledge and technology has been used with deadly effects in wars, there is a need for some ethical checks and balances to be put in place. Pope Francis decries the fact that this technological development has not been accompanied by a similar development in human responsibility, values, and conscience, so that the acceptance of "infinite or unlimited growth, which proves so attract-tive to economists, financiers and experts in technology" has not grasped the notion that we can squeeze the planet dry beyond every limit. "It is the false notion that an 'infinite quantity of energy and resources are available, that it is possible to renew them quickly, and that the negative effects of exploitation of the natural order can be easily absorbed." [106] Pope Francis writes, "We have to accept that technological products are not neutral, for the they create a framework which ends up conditioning lifestyles and shaping social possibilities along the lines dictated by the interests of certain powerful groups." [107] Our man-centered approach to reality, with little reference to the Creator and His intent has led us to this scenario, whereby "neglecting to monitor the harm done to nature and the environmental impact of our decisions is only the most striking sign of a disregard for the message contained in the structures of nature itself. When we fail to acknowledge as part of reality the worth of a poor person, a human embryo, a person with disabilities - to offer just a few example – it becomes difficult to hear the cry of nature itself; everything is connected. Once the human being declares independence from reality {i.e. God} and behaves with absolute dominion, the very foundations of our life begin to crumble, for 'instead of carrying out his role as a cooperator with God in the work of creation, man sets himself up in the place of God and thus ends up provoking a rebellion on the part of nature."
