Good News!

We might forgive James and John for their ambition. They had, after all, been with Jesus since the beginning. They had seen him heal the ill, cast out demons, and preach about repentance for the forgiveness of sins. Surely Jesus had a power that no one else had. And surely he would give it away to those who asked for it. James and John make a mistake. They thought power and greatness have to do with position.

We are so like them. We often think that people are great if they have abundant wealth or prestigious titles. We consider them powerful if they have higher or several degrees or if the world judges them to be attractive. And the world tells us this is so. But Jesus has a different message. Greatness has nothing to do with wealth or education. Sitting at the right and left hand of Jesus does not depend on appearance, position, or accomplishments. Rather, greatness comes from being willing to empty yourself for the sake of others. Our power lies in being the least among our neighbors.

Jesus challenges us in this reading. He dares us to let go of our ideas of greatness and to become servants of all. He invites us to "do the lesser things" with no strings attached or expectation of reward. (The word "ministry" comes from the Latin *minus/ minor* and Greek *meion*, meaning "less, smaller.") We must serve in love out of love for him. This week, look for little things you can do for others, giving thanks to God for this invitation.



FROM PASTOR'S DESK

As we continue reflecting upon Pope Francis' recent Encyclical, "On Care for Our Common Home", we consider for a moment to new biological technologies and how this must be regulated rather than 'anything goes' approach. The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches that experimentation on animals is morally acceptable only "if it remains with reasonable limits and contributes to caring for or saving human lives, and furthermore that "it is contrary to human dignity to cause animals to suffer or die needlessly." [130] Here Pope Francis refers to balanced position of Pope John Paul II who stressed the benefits of scientific and technological progress as evidence of 'the nobility of the human vocation to participate responsibly in God's creative action', while also noting that 'we cannot interfere in one area of the ecosystem without paying due attention to the consequences of such interference in other areas.' [131] While the Church appreciates the benefits of well applied science and knowledge, St. John Paul II would caution against 'indiscriminate genetic manipulation' which ignores the negative effects of such interventions. While reserving judgment about genetic modification (GM), whether vegetable or animal, medical or agricultural, and how risks come not from the techniques themselves but in their improper or excessive application, "there remain a number of significant difficulties which should not be underestimated." [133-134] An example of this would be the introduction of GM cereals leading to the concentration of productive lands in the hands of fewer owners and the disappearance of small producers, and how those who remain are left with infertile seeds and must purchase seeds from larger producers. [134] This calls for broad, responsible scientific and social debate with complete access to reliable information, unfettered by politico-economic or ideological interest groups, fully independent and inter-disciplinary in scope. Once again, Pope Francis points out the inconsistency of some ecological movements defending "the integrity of the environ- ment, rightly demanding that certain limits be imposed on scientific research, [but] sometimes failing to apply those same principles to human life. There is a tendency to justify transgressing all boundaries when experimentation of carried out on living human embryos. We forget that the inalienable worth of a human being transcends his or her degree of development. In the same way, when technology disregards the great ethical principles, it ends up considering any practice whatsoever as licit. As we have seen in this chapter, a technology severed from ethics will not easily be able to limit its own power." [136]
