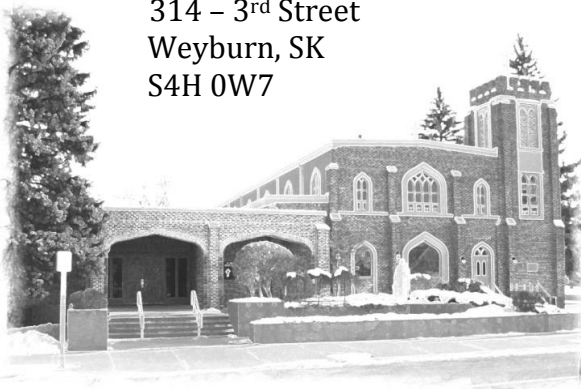

In today's gospel, we learn an incredible lesson about what happens when we act out in faith, even amidst opposing people.

The blind man (Bartimaeus) called out to Jesus, because he knew that Christ could heal Him, and He believed that Christ would. He had faith. And even when people around him tried to hush him, the man was not deterred. He continued to cry out with courage and conviction.

In turn, Jesus gave the man his sight back, and the gospel tells us that the man then followed Jesus "on the way."

Christian discipleship begins with a faith response to Jesus. He has called us to Himself, and we must choose how we will respond. We must take ownership of the faith He has blessed us with and choose to live in faith, to live for Him — even when we face opposition.

We give Jesus our lives. We live boldly and courageously, giving our time, talents and treasure to serve Him, in the myriads of opportunities God gives us every day because, like Bartimaeus, we believe!

One of the myriads of opportunities the Lord gives us to boldly and courageously live our faith is by giving to the Archdiocesan Annual Appeal in as many ways as we can, monetarily, or by spiritual contribution, offering time to pray our devotional prayers every day for the 8 weeks of campaign. With our gifts, we are investing in the continuous building of God's Kingdom in our part of the world for our generation and for the next. By generously giving of yourself you follow the Lord as boldly and courageously as Bartimaeus whose boldness of faith in Jesus led to the healing of his blindness, and by his clear sight he followed the Lord to Jerusalem and beyond.

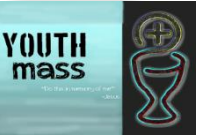

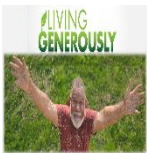

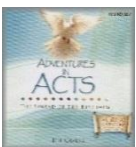

Liturgy and Worship is the focal point of our Catholic Faith, where we come together as Catholics to celebrate the fundamental beliefs of our Faith. Our worship is enriched when members of the parish participate in various ministries. These ministries provide many opportunities for the sharing of our time and talent and for giving back the gifts God has given us.

Stewardship opportunity: To assist the celebrant at Mass in the distribution of Communion and the Cup.

Talent/Gift to offer: An attitude of reverence toward the Sacrament and a willingness to help the people of God share in full communion.

FROM PASTOR'S DESK:

As we continue reflecting upon Pope Francis' recent Encyclical, "On Care for Our Common Home", Chapter IV is focused on "Integral Ecology" whereby the inter-connectedness among everything is emphasized, so that we address the issues and problems in our environment and facing society as a cohesive whole, and not as isolated parts. "Nature cannot be regarded as something separate from ourselves or as a mere setting in which we live. We are part of nature, included in it and thus in constant interaction with it." [139] We are not simply dealing with separate and distinct problems, environmental on the one hand and social on the other; but "one complex crisis which is both social and environmental. Strategies for a solution demand an integrated approach to combating poverty, restoring dignity to the excluded, and at the same time protecting nature." [139] Pope Francis encourages that we "give researchers their due role, to facilitate their interaction, and to ensure broad academic freedom. Ongoing research should also give us a better understanding of how different creatures relate to one another in making up the larger units which today we term 'ecosystems.' We take these systems into account not only to determine how best to use them, but also because they have an intrinsic value independent of their usefulness. Each organism, as a creature of God, is good and admirable in itself; the same is true of the harmonious ensemble of organisms existing in a defined space and functioning as a system. Although we are often not aware of it, we depend on these larger systems for our own existence. We need only recall how ecosystems interest in dispersing carbon dioxide, purifying water, controlling illnesses and epidemics, forming soil, breaking down waste, and in many other ways which we overlook or simply do not know about." [140] In this perspective, economic growth which has tended "to produce predictable reactions and a certain standardization with the aim of simplifying procedures and reducing costs" needs to be brought into "the service of a more integral and integrating vision," so that "the protection of the environment is an integral part of the development process and cannot be considered in isolation from it." [141]"If everything is related, then the health of a society's institutions has consequences for the environment and the quality of life." Whether it is injustice, poverty, violence, or the loss of freedom, anything which weakens our human institutions will have negative consequences on the environmental by displacing people and putting pressures on other parts of our society. [142] Are there not more humane and just ways to address these issues that does less damage to the earth, so that it might rightly sustain the life of all people. *{To be continued...}*
