
The readings today employ different images in describing the 'state' or the 'place' of the saints. The reading from the Book of Revelation mentions 'a great multitude, which no one could count, from every nation, from all tribes, and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, robed in white with palm branches in their hands.' The second reading from the first letter of John speaks of the Father's love which makes us children of God. "We are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when he is revealed, we will be like him, for we will see him as he is."

The gospel reading is Matthew's version of the beatitudes. Saintliness is equated with blessedness. And blessedness is not mere happiness. It is being 'graced' or 'favored' by God. Like Mary, full of grace, because she is the 'highly favored one' [Lk.1:28]. Or like the song of the Angels in Bethlehem: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests" [Lk.2:14]. The saints are those 'Blessed,' 'Graced' and 'Favored' by God. These are: the poor in spirit, those who mourn, those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, the meek and merciful and clean of heart, the peace makers, those persecuted for the sake of righteousness. Saints' inherently have these traits as favored and graced at responding to situations, they share their lives generously - all their gifts to others unreservedly for the good of others.

There are many more Saints than those listed in the Book of Saints and heroes our faith. These are the 'undeclared Saints.' We see them around us, in our family, in the community, in our work places, in the church, in school; those whose disposition in life inspire us to be better persons. These are humans like us who share all they have so that others may live. Saints make the world a better place to live in. They are a multitude, holding palm branches before God in heaven as well the ones we rub elbows with every day.

Today, let us recall those 'undeclared saints' in our midst who've made God's love real, and tangible. All of them have one thing in common, they shared generously and spontaneously their time, talent, treasure - all that they can, all that they have to help others.



FROM PASTOR'S DESK:

In our reflection upon Pope Francis' recent Encyclical, "On Care for Our Common Home", he briefly addresses the notion of a cultural ecology, whereby he says that "together with the patrimony (heritage) of nature, there is also an historic, artistic, and cultural patrimony which is likewise under threat." "There is a need to incorporate the history, culture and architecture of each place, thus [reserving its original identity. Ecology, then, also involves protecting the cultural treasures of humanity in the broadest sense." [143] Yet, "a consumerist vision of human beings, encouraged by the mechanisms of today's globalized economy, has a leveling effect on cultures, diminishing the immense variety which is the heritage of all humanity. [144] "The imposition of a dominant lifestyle linked to a single form of production can be just as harmful as the altering of ecosystems. [145] Then Pope Francis mentions that it is important, even "essential to show special care for indigenous communities and their cultural traditions. When they remain on their land, they themselves care for it best. Nevertheless, in various parts of the world, pressure is put on them to abandon their homelands to make room for agricultural or mining projects which are undertaken without regard for the degradation of nature and culture." [146] Next, Pope Francis speaks to the Ecology of Daily Life, saying: "An admirable creativity and generosity is shown by persons and groups who respond to environmental limitations by alleviating the adverse effects of their surroundings and learning to orient their lives amid disorder and uncertainty. By fostering great care for the interior of their homes, or finding contentment in the kindness and friendliness of others, "a wholesome social life can light up a seemingly undesirable environment. At times a commendable human ecology is practiced by the poor despite numerous hardships." [148] While it is true that "the extreme poverty experienced in areas lacking harmony, open spaces or potential for integration, can lead to incidents of brutality or exploitation by criminal organizations, ...so that the daily experience of overcrowding and social anonymity can create a sense of uprootedness which spawns antisocial behavior and violence," the Pope insists that love always proves more powerful. "Many people in these conditions are able to weave bonds of belonging and togetherness which convert over-crowding into an experience of community in which the walls of the ego are torn down and the barriers of selfishness over-come. This experience of a communitarian salvation often generates creative ideas for the improvement of a building or a neighbourbood." [149] {To be continued....}
