Good News!

One of the most memorable questions I have ever been asked came out of a conversation with a spiritual director. During my marriage-preparation retreat, he asked about the upcoming wedding. I told him about all the preparations and how I felt like I was on top of things. He gently said, "I know you are prepared, but are you ready?" It was the first time I really thought about the difference.

We were certainly prepared. The flowers had been ordered, the ceremony set, and the caterer knew exactly what we wanted. We were in control. But being ready for the great unknown of marriage, a lifelong vocation, was another thing altogether. Being ready suggested that we won't always be in control and that, no matter what happens, we were in it for life and would face whatever comes together.

The prophet Isaiah describes John the Baptist as the one who prepares the way of the Lord. He will do this by preaching to and baptizing those who come to him. The preparation for the coming Messiah is in his hands. He poses the question, "Are you ready for the one who is to come?" Thinking beyond our religious practices and Christmas preparations, what does that really mean for us?

Maybe this year it means looking into our own hearts for the longing for Christ. Perhaps we will make a room for him in our busy lives and our busier thoughts. We might even stop our preparations long enough to remember just who is coming and invite him in. Are you ready?



FROM PASTOR'S DESK:

In our reflection upon Pope Francis' recent Encyclical, "On Care for Our Common Home", Pope Francis devotes this last section to the examination of an 'ecological' spirituality which can inspire, encourage, motivate, nourish and give meaning to both our individual and communal activity, as we work to protect the world. [216] Pope Benedict XVI once said: "The external deserts in the world are growing, because the internal deserts have become so vast." While the ecological crisis calls for a profound interior conversion, yet this is not enough without there being a community conversion, because "self-improvement on the part of individuals will not by itself remedy the extremely complex situation facing our world today." "Social problems must be addressed by community networks and not simply by the sum of individual good deeds." [219] As Pope Francis calls for an "ecological conversion" on the part of all peoples, he states strongly that "living our vocation to be protectors of God's handiwork is essential to a life of virtue; it is not an optional or secondary aspect of our Christian experience." [217] Appealing to the example of St. Francis of Assisi and his great desire to live in a healthy relationship with all of God's creation, Pope Francis speaks of the importance of fostering "gratitude and gratuitousness, a recognition that the world is God's loving gift, and that we are called quietly to imitate His generosity in self-sacrifice and good works." [220] St. Francis' Canticle to Creation' refers to Brother Sun, Sister Moon, Sister Water, Brother Fire and so forth, invites us to nurture the sublime fraternity with all creation that he so radiantly embodied in his humility and spirit of simplicity and poverty. Pope Francis focuses upon the principle of "less is more", whereby our "Christian spirituality proposes a growth marked by moderation and the capacity to be happy with little. It is a return to that simplicity which allows us to stop and appreciate the small things, to be grateful for the opportunities which life affords us, to be spiritually detached from what we possess, and not to succumb to sadness for what we lack." [222] Such an approach to life does not mean a lesser life or one lived less intensely, but it involves truly living life to the full, where being content with what we have we learn to enjoy each person and thing in themselves, rather than simply looking for more and to fulfill our unsatisfied desires and wants. Because we have gotten away from this humility and sobriety (living moderately), all kinds of problems have arisen, whereby "we consider ourselves autonomous, when we exclude God from our lives or replace Him with our own ego, and think that our subjective feelings can define what is right and what is wrong." [224] There is too much needing summarizing yet to conclude now as I had initially planned. {To be continued....}
